Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> is Gloriously Messy down at the Indi Club – starting at 4:30pm. Everyone is welcome!


Tuesday 13th is Lunchtime Communion, 12pm in Church.

# Pray for our schools work this Christmas!

Building on the positive links and relationships with Sneyd Academy and Holden Lane Primary school, we are going to have an opportunity to share the real meaning of Christmas with hundreds of local children and many of their parents over the coming weeks — both inviting groups of children to church for Christingle services and doing assemblies, services and lessons in the schools too. PLEASE PRAY for this ministry and especially for Sarah, Tom and I and our opportunities to talk openly about Jesus this Christmas! We are gathering to pray for this specifically on Wednesday 7<sup>th</sup> December from 10am in church if you are available to join us.



### Children and Holy Communion

At our last two PCC meetings, we did some theological and liturgical exploration around the issue of children receiving Holy Communion at St Andrew's. We balanced the historic position that children have been allowed to receive the bread (wafer) alongside the Church of England and Diocesan guidance that children should firstly be baptised and secondly introduced to communion in a formal way. A number of things have come out of this discussion which I would like to share with you.

- Holy Communion is deeply significant and important and Paul is clear that it is not to be taken lightly. (1 Corinthians 11:17-34)
- Receiving the bread/wafer is a full experience of Communion according to Anglican theology, you are not 'second best' if you don't take the
  - wine. Therefore there is no reason to not allow all who receive communion to do so with both the bread and the wine.
- 3. Although baptism is the strict entry point into the community of faith enabling somebody to take communion, we felt it important to continue to allow those who have been dedicated to receive, and those who believe

- and trust in Jesus in their heart to do so as well and bring their children too.
- 4. We have therefore taken the decision to have a policy that children may receive both the bread and wine, which continues to be at the parents' discretion. This could be via one of the cups (alcoholic or non-alcoholic) or having the wafer dipped.
- 5. To enable greater accessibility for those who choose to receive non-alcoholic wine, we will move to having this in the small chalice used for dipping (at the 10:30am service only).
- 6. We will also be doing some work in teaching our children the true meaning of Communion over the coming months, so they are more fully equipped to 'receive in a worthy manner'.
- 7. Finally, our Easter plans culminate in a service of Baptism and Confirmation on Easter Sunday with Bishop Matthew coming. There is an open invitation to all who are interested in being baptised (young or old) or those who would like to find out more about confirmation to let Tom or I know. There will be a series of preparation sessions in the lead up to Easter for those interested.



## Hall Cleaning

Sam Littler has decided to step down from her role of cleaning the Church Hall which she has done faithfully every week. Firstly, we would like to say a massive thank you to Sam for doing this for us. Secondly, we are looking to employ a cleaner to take on that role for approximately 3 hours a week. This would involve the main hall, toilets and kitchen, being flexible around hall bookings. All cleaning equipment and products provided.
