

Update Letter – Thursday 29th October 2020

Dear all,

I recently heard somebody say that there are a number of possible options for the word or phrase of the year this year, perhaps 'unprecedented' will be chosen or maybe 'Social Distancing'. Upon reflection on this second option, actually



that doesn't sit well with me. We don't need more social distance, we need more social connection. We all know too well that the regulations require us to keep a recommended 2m apart from other people however as the autumn drawn in, evenings get darker and colder, we must keep connected to one-another. This is where there is such sadness at the lack of human interaction in how we do Church at the moment. For those who join us online, we don't get that sense of worshipping alongside others and for those who come to the building church, we have to sit distanced, with masks on unable to socialise before or after.

The Bible expresses that Church is to be like a body, where each and every part is



needed and important; it is to be a community where we help and care for those in need; it is to be an army where we go into battle alongside our fellow comrades; it is a family who sit and eat together; it is a worshipping expression building one another up and spurring each other on towards the love of Jesus and all that he calls us to. In this ongoing season, we have to consider how we express Church in these ways even in lockdown. I

would like to invite you to pray, to consider how you might be church to somebody else this week — call somebody and share an encouragement from scripture, buy somebody a gift and leave it by their door, write somebody a letter or a card or find out a prayer need and commit to battling with the Lord to see it answered. We are called to be united in our fellowship, in our love and in our mission to the world and we need each other to do that.

Thank you to everyone who came along to the annual meeting on Sunday – I was sad not be in Church myself but I hope the technology enabled the meeting to happen successfully. Particular thanks to all those who helped make it happen plus those who worked behind the scenes in the weeks and months beforehand.

I'm looking forward to working to see the vision of St Andrew's move forward under their collective leadership.

Remembrance 2020 is going to look a bit different from previous years but we will be doing a couple of things to commemorate as is appropriate. Firstly there will be a minute's silence in both our services on Remembrance Sunday 8th November, secondly, I will be streaming a short act of remembrance on the 11th just before 11am live on Facebook (there won't be a Tuesday communion on 10th) and finally, we will be inviting people to place a poppy in a simple remembrance garden on the front lawn from Sunday 1st November onwards. I have also received a delivery of poppies from the Royal British Legion and would be happy to distribute them to anyone who'd like one — alternatively you can print one off from their website.
